RESOLUTION 2022-08 2023 Budget

BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED BY THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE RIVERSIDE FIRE AUTHORITY AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. That the Lewis County Assessor has notified the Commissioners of the Riverside Fire Authority ("Authority"), having an estimated population of 26,000, that the assessed valuation of real property lying within the boundaries of the Authority for the upcoming calendar year of 2023 is \$3,843,706,419 as to the General Fund and \$3,943,225,113 as to the EMS Fund.
- 2. Pursuant to notice, the Commissioners held a public hearing on revenue sources and expenditures for the district's current expense budget for 2023 on November 16, 2022, pursuant to RCW 84.55.120. At such hearing, the Board of Commissioners considered possible increases in property tax revenues. As a part of the budget process, the Board adopted Resolutions 2022-09, 2022-10 authorizing increases in property tax revenue, in terms of dollars and percentage increases, both for the EMS Levy and the General Fire Levy.
- The aforementioned resolutions are attached hereto and made a part of this Resolution and are hereby adopted to the budget of the Authority for the calendar year 2023.
- 4. That the Honorable Assessor of Lewis County, Washington, is hereby requested to make levies for year 2023 for the Authority of \$4,777,507.10 as the General Levy and \$1,921,137.80 as the EMS Levy.
- 5. That the Honorable Treasurer of Lewis County, Washington, is hereby authorized and directed to deposit and sequester the monies received from the collection of the tax levies specified in Section 4, as follows:
 - C. \$4,777,507.10 into the General Obligation Bond Fund
 - D. \$1,921,137.80 into the EMS Fund
- 6. That one copy of this Resolution with attachments be delivered to the Lewis County Board of County Commissioners Office who will submit a copy to the Lewis County Assessors Office.
- 7. Pursuant to RCW 84.52.125, as amended by chapter 196 of the Laws of 2017, it is the intent of the Authority, acting by and through its board of commissioners, to protect the Authority's tax levy from prorationing under RCW 84.52.010(2), by imposing up to a total of twenty-five cents (\$0.25)

per thousand dollars of assessed valuation of the tax levies authorized under RCW 52.16.140 and RCW 52.16.160 [RCW 52.26.140 for RFA's], or either of them, outside of the five dollars and ninety cents per thousand dollars of valuation limitation established under RCW 84.52.043(2), if those taxes would otherwise be prorated under RCW 84.52.010(2)(e).

Pursuant to RCW 84.55.092, it is the further intent of the fire authority commissioners to protect the fire authority's future levy capacity. Therefore, in any year in which the authority reduces the regular tax levy below the amount of levy to which the authority is entitled by law, consistent with existing voter authorizations and the limitations of the state constitution and statutes, it is the authority's intent to fully preserve future levy capacity as the aforesaid statute allows. The county assessor is therefore requested to set the regular property tax levy at the amount which would be allowed under RCW 84.55, as if the regular property tax for the district for taxes due in prior years (beginning with 1986) had been set for the full or maximum amount authorized under the law.

RIVERSIDE FIRE AUTHORITY RESOLUTION NO. 22-05

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF FIRE COMMISSIONERS OF RIVERSIDE FIRE AUTHORITY, RELATING TO THE AUTHORITY'S POLICY TO FOSTER OPEN GOVERNMENT AND ENCOURAGE PUBLIC PARTICIPATION IN RFA MEETINGS.

WHEREAS, Governor Inslee has rescinded Proclamation 20-28, effective June 1, 2022, so that in-person board meetings are allowed again; and

WHEREAS, the Washington State Legislature has passed ESHB 1329 and Chapter 42.30 of the RCW (hereinafter the OPMA) has been amended to encourage greater public participation in board meetings, including through the use of technology allowing for remote participation in meetings; **NOW THEREFORE**:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF FIRE COMMISSIONERS OF RIVERSIDE FIRE AUTHORITY, LEWIS COUNTY, WASHINGTON, AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1.</u> It shall be the policy of Riverside Fire Authority to foster open government and encourage public participation in RFA board meetings through the implementation of this resolution, which shall be effective June 1, 2022, unless otherwise set forth herein.

Section 2. Effective June 1, 2022, the Governor of the State of Washington has rescinded Proclamation 20-28 and all subsequent versions thereof. That proclamation prohibited in-person board meetings during the Covid-19 pandemic. Although the recent Governor's order continues the state-declared emergency pursuant to applicable laws, the prohibition on in-person meetings has ended, effective June 1, 2022. However, the Legislature in 2022 adopted ESHB 1329, which modified certain Open Public Meetings Act (OPMA) provisions, allowing under certain circumstances the holding of virtual or remote meetings, as an alternative to in-person meetings or in addition to an in-person meeting, especially for individuals with disabilities, or persons who may have difficulty attending.

<u>Section 3.</u> Due to the changes described in Section 2 above, the new board policy on open public meetings is hereby adopted and all prior resolutions and/or policies on this subject are hereby rescinded or superseded by this resolution.

Section 4. The board and Riverside Fire Authority's policy on this subject is as follows:

a. Unless a regular meeting is cancelled pursuant to notice or due to a declared emergency, the regular meetings of this fire authority shall be held on the 2nd and 4th Wednesday of each month, commencing at 5:00 o'clock p.m. at the following location: Station 2 Headquarters, 1818 Harrison Avenue.

- b. Riverside Fire Authority will not ordinarily offer a virtual option to allow remote participation in the meetings by members of the public. If any member of the public not physically attending a meeting desires to submit a comment, that comment should be forwarded to the Board Secretary by noon of the scheduled meeting day. Such written comments will be shared with the board prior to or during the meeting.
- c. Although the Authority ordinarily does not offer a virtual participation option, if any member of the public submits a request to the Board Secretary prior to noon of the scheduled meeting day stating that they will have difficulty attending in-person due to a disability, limited mobility, or for any other reason that makes physical attendance impossible or difficult for them, then the RFA will endeavor, when feasible, to accommodate them by offering an alternative way to participate, such as by telephone or other technology.
- d. Board members are always allowed to participate remotely in board meetings, but should advise the Board Secretary prior to the meeting so that technology is implemented to assure that the member's remote participation may be heard, or observed and heard by those attending or participating.
- e. Public comment by in-person participants shall always be allowed at all meetings of the board and shall be received via the procedure provided by existing RFA Policy # 117 Public Meetings. The Open Public Meetings Act (OPMA) allows the Chair to control the order of speaking during meetings, so no one will be allowed to speak without first being recognized by the Chair. The RFA will place on each agenda a "Public Comment Period" and it is requested that comments be made during that designated period. The OPMA allows for suspension of meetings in the event of disruptions that interfere with the work of the Board. The Board has no obligation to respond immediately to either verbal or written comments submitted at or prior to public meetings.
- f. The Board and the authority do reserve the right, under prescribed conditions, to hold one or more meetings <u>only</u> by having a virtual or remote option, instead of an in-person meeting. This may be done, but will be done only during a declared local, state, or federal (national) emergency. For example, during a pandemic or other disaster, the Board may determine that safety concerns or other exigencies may make it impossible or unwise to hold an inperson meeting with reasonable safety. This option will be used sparingly, and when feasible, remote participation by the public will still be offered, to assure transparency and open government.
